Abstract

The climate crisis has spurred debates about how to address the relocation of whole communities away from vulnerable areas. To investigate this issue, a comparative case study was conducted of two initially similar Honduran resettlements built for survivors of Hurricane Mitch (1998) by two different organizations in subsequent years.

Twelve years after the hurricane, one resettlement had high crime, low participation, and low social capital, while the other maintained a high degree of safety and social health. Drawing on ethnography, interviews, and surveys, the data suggests that displaced groups need significant external support and guidance to develop from a resettlement into a community.
